1. The text below is an extract from a speech made by the father of the bride at a wedding celebration.

Read the extract and then answer the question below. You should use appropriate terminology and provide relevant supporting examples.

- (a) **Using the extract as a starting point, analyse and evaluate how spoken language is used at celebratory occasions. You must refer to other examples of how people celebrating an occasion use language in your response.** [40]

In planning your response, you should consider:

- the lexical and grammatical choices
- the relationship between participants
- contextual factors relevant to this text and other spoken examples.

- the relationship between writers and readers
- contextual factors relevant to this text and other examples of influential texts.
